Course Description:

The objective of this course is to study how 'Asia' has been imagined and constructed by Japanese and how 'Japan' has been imagined and constructed in different parts of Asia between the late 19th century and today. By examining changes and continuities in different views and typologies of mutual perceptions in modern history, students will learn how images of the Self and the Other are inter-related and often serve as an instrument for the justification of certain social, economic, or diplomatic policies. Through a combination of readings (home, inclass), lectures, and discussions, we will approach the broader issue of Japanese views of Asia and Asian views of Japan. In addition, readings on case studies will introduce and discuss well-known and lesser-known examples of such mutual perceptions.
