Course Description:

This course aims to develop an understanding of Japan's socioeconomic structure and its role in international peace-building. Aspects of Japanese society, culture, economics and politics will be presented both in traditional as well as modern contexts. In particular, the course explicates the dynamics of Japan's contribution to peace building through economic cooperation with its ODA program, personnel cooperation under the International Peace Cooperation Law, and intellectual contribution in the international arena, since Japan pays more attention to peace-building efforts to prevent conflicts from occurring (or recurring) in certain countries and regions. This course consists of lectures, discussion, group research and presentations. Students will examine and discuss perspectives on contemporary global peace-building challenges and role of Japan in pairs. The course will address modern Japan and its socio-economic nexus vis-a-vis and international peace-building while encouraging students to formulate opinions on this topic.
